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## Some things are changing at Compass

### **COMPASS UNIFORM**

As Compass moves forward and is progressing in all areas, we have taken the time to look at what developments need to be put in place to strengthen the school further next academic year. After canvassing parents and students, we have decided to phase in a school uniform from September. This will only be a basic uniform and it will have a degree of choice attached to it. To save students the hassle of deciding what to put on in the mornings (and parents the expense of branded sportswear) we are encouraging parents to purchase school polo shirts. These are shirts that are made of good quality fabric and will be available to purchase from *Dorset Embroidery Printwear (DEP), Lynch Lane, Weymouth* from the summer holidays. These will be available in either dark grey, navy or teal. Students who attend Hair & Beauty will already to used to wearing these. PE staff currently wear them as uniform and GCSE PE students will also be wearing these from September. Details will be sent out to parents/ guardians in due course.

We have sourced a 1/4 zip outer top to go over the top of the polo shirts. Students may continue to wear appropriate bottoms and shoes for the day. We recognise most students come prepared for practical activities on the day and we wouldn't want this to change due to our lack of PE changing facilities.


# CONDUCT

There are a few areas of conduct across the school that cause concern and we need to work on with parents and carers continued support.

- They fall into the categories of behaviour stemming from consumption of energy drinks, including Lucozade and other sports related isotonic concoctions and highly sugary foods
- Foul and offensive language including that of a sexualised nature
- Issues that stem from students accessing social media sites for cyber bullying and other activities that could bring them and this school into disrepute. Some of their activities may also put themselves and others at risk of harm

The handing in of mobile phones at the beginning of the school day has worked really well and students are much more focussed in class because they are distracted less. We intend to continue with this policy next year.

We have again included at quick reference for the age restrictions that apply to social media sites below. Please can we urge you to apply age restrictions and monitor the content of your child's social medial use, it may prevent issues of a more serious nature from developing in the first place.



Of equal concern is the fact that a very small minority of students have caused wilful damage to the fabric of the centre; these are often acts of criminal damage and afterwards the choices are; to pursue with the police or to attempt to recover the costs of repair through parents and carers and attempt some restorative work.

### **SCHOOL GATES**

The second big development in preparation for September 2019, has been the school site. You may might be aware of the building works that have happened this year in order for us to be able to offer a more bespoke curriculum from September, making the site safer and looking much better than previously. Part of this has been to secure the site with new fences, CCTV and lockable gates. These are very much in place to keep unwanted visitors out, as much as keeping young people safe in school. As a result of this we have decided that the school gates will be locked during the school day, meaning that once students are in school, they will stay in for the day. Gates will be locked at 9am. Any students arriving late will need to press the intercom to be let in and will be signed in late. Students will no longer be able to go offsite at break or lunch, meaning that all students will need to bring a packed lunch and plenty of non-carbonated drink for the day. Students with Free school meals will be catered for onsite. As well as keeping students safe in the community, it also means that the temptations for meeting other students, being late, buying inappropriate items from the shop that are not conducive for students learning are taken away. Staff will continue to check students in the morning and the same rules will still apply to phones and other banned items.

As a result of these changes, the aim is to have a student body in the right frame to learn, improved attainment and progress, improved attendance and punctuality and above all, a safe environment to learn in.

For those parents whom are aware that their child has a serious addiction to nicotine, it may be a good opportunity to seek smoking cessation help over the course of the summer break to assist your child manage their cravings from September; as with all Dorset Council properties, Compass is a non-smoking site. As a quick reminder, the law of the land states that: you must be over 18 to buy cigarettes in the UK. If you're under 16 the police have the right to confiscate your cigarettes. Also' it's illegal:

- for shops to sell you cigarettes if you are underage (18)
- for an adult to buy you cigarettes if you are under 18
- to smoke in a car with a child.

Some sources of help could include:

- NHS Livewell has a guide to quitting smoking for young people
- Talk to Frank offers friendly, confidential advice on drugs
- The Mix provides <u>real life stories</u> and advice about quitting smoking.
- ASH (Action on Smoking and Health) for a <u>list of smoking helplines in the UK</u>, including helplines in other languages

Visitors to the school will need to park in the sat the bottom of the site and make their way towards the pedestrian gate where there is an intercom system linked with the office.

# ART GCSE COMPLETE

It took hard work to sort through the books and box them all up but it is a good feeling to know that those books will help children in Africa who have so few resources.

## CATERING

We have had a busy year with the Catering students; a group of year 11's went out to the Quayside restaurant in Weymouth to learn how to make pizza dough and toppings. While some of the year, 10 and 11 catering students have worked well towards their ASDAN and City & Guilds qualifications. The year 10/11 catering students also gained their "Basic Food Hygiene certificates".





This is a great achievement as the employers recognise the NVQ as an excellent foundation for those students wishing to seek employment in the area we live in as it has many opportunities for the students to find employment in the catering industry.

### Chesil Coast Geography field trip

The year 11 pupils studying geography had the opportunity to carry out some fieldwork in preparation for their GCSE exams. The group visited various beaches along the coast in order to take random pebble samples and prove the existence of Longshore Drift. The pupils used a variety of interesting methods to ensure that they got good samples, recorded the primary data themselves and pupils interviewed members of the public in the afternoon. All the pupils were superbly behaved throughout the trip and had a really good time in the sunshine on the beautiful Jurassic Coast.

# SCIENCE

## Year 9 Science Trip to Winchester Science Centre and Planetarium

On Tuesday 25<sup>th</sup> June the year 9s and one year 10 went to Winchester Science Centre and Planetarium.

We started the visit with a look around the exhibitions, which included a real space suit, a trip inside the human body and creating a tornado.

We then took part in a hands-on Matter workshop where we discussed the three states of matter (solid, liquid and gas) and then had the opportunity to make a fourth state of matter - non-Newtonian fluid. We experimented with making two different types using glue, borax and pink stuff. The materials flow like liquid when still, but if kept moving act more like a solid and can be rolled into a ball.

This was followed by a number of sport science activities – racing 10m from the blocks (competitive Tom, the class teaching assistant, was intent on winning every race), rowing and playing wheelchair basketball.

Lunch was followed by a fantastic planetarium show. During the show we travelled into space to visit the Moon, Venus, Mars and Jupiter before leaving the Milky Way to see how incredibly small we are when put against a backdrop of the rest of the Universe.

Despite one student possibly taking a small snooze in the planetarium, the whole group had an enjoyable day and were an asset to Compass with their enthusiasm and in the way that they behaved. Well done!
