MATHS NEWS

Year 11 students have completed their controlled assessment and as we move closer to their exams, they have impressed me with their diligence and resilience working through the exam papers. As we approach the mocks in January, I'll take this opportunity to remind them of the importance of writing down the calculations including when they have used a calculator. This year we are running both higher tier and foundation tier as well as putting some students through their entry level qualification and GCSE statistics.

Students in Year 10 have grappled with some algebra and more recently have working on converting between fractions, decimals and percentages, as well as calculating percentages for increasing and decreasing.



Year 9 students have risen to the challenge of dealing with data and some algebra. During the course of the year we will cover topics that they have both seen before and new concepts aimed at developing their confidence with maths and building their bank of knowledge. *Alison*

NEWS FROM KEY STAGE 3

Key Stage 3 students have enjoyed a successful first term, and after many different experiences as a group and working as a team, are ending the term as a cohesive unit.

We have been out and about for our Outdoor Education provision, specifically going to local points of interest such as Swanage, Bowleaze Cove, and the beach.



We have also been visiting the Seal Cove Climbing Centre in Bridport this term to try our hand at indoor climbing and we are pleased to report that it has been a huge success. All students have been able to scale heights they previously thought impossible and in some cases overcome their fear of heights to reach the top of the wall. It takes an amazing amount of courage to push themselves forward in activities that they are not already competent in, and in doing so they develop greater resilience and confidence to try to get better in other challenges they may face in the future. We are all extremely proud of them and their positive attitudes.

We have been learning about WWII in English, and this has allowed for some wonderful opportunities for discussion and prompted mature responses to some tricky topics.

In our People and Places lessons, we have been learning about the Civil Rights movement, in which we have covered slavery, colonialism and segregation in America. Y9	Health and Wellbeing	We are working towards the RSPH Young Health Champion Certificate in partnership with Weymouth College. This is a level 2 qualification which teaches young people about managing their own health and wellbeing.							
Y10	Living in the Wider World	Year 10 will be moving onto the 2 nd unit of the BTEC in Personal Growth and Wellbeing. This focuses on careers and planning for their futures and includes choosing different jobs and careers, where to find career and job information, setting goals for the future, writing CVs and interview techniques.							
Y11	Health and Wellbeing	Year 11 will be completing their final unit of the BTEC in Personal Growth and Wellbeing with a focus on relationships and wellbeing. This includes: Healthy relationships, sexual health, consent, exploitation, victim blaming, contraception, STIs, pregnancy, LGBT+ issues and violence in relationships.

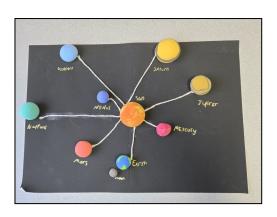
This will help our students gain a real understanding of the AQA GCSE English Language paper.

SCIENCE NEWS

It's been an exciting and productive term in the Science Department, with students across all year groups demonstrating curiosity, creativity and resilience in their learning.

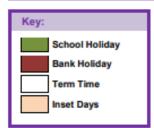

What Parents & Educators Need to Know about

TRACKING DEVICES

WHAT ARE THE RISKS? Bluetooth tracking devices like Apple's AirTag and Samsung's SmartTags have exploded in popularity, with millions sold each year. These small tools help people locate their lost items, but their discreet design has also made them attractive for more sinister purposes. From stalking to bullying, tracking devices present unique risks that trusted adults need to understand and address.

STALKING AND HARASSMENT

Because of their tiny size and unassuming appearance, tracking devices can easily be hidden in bags or clothing. They've been used to monitor individuals without their knowledge, with a lawsuit in the US labelling AirTags "the weapon of choice of stalkers and abusers". In the UK, use of tracking devices in coercive control and stalking cases reportedly rose by 317 percent between 2018 and 2023.

TOOLS FOR

Tracking devices could allow bullies to follow or locate their targets even outside of school. This makes it difficult for children to find refuge, potentially extending the trauma of bullying into spaces – like home that should feel safe and secure.

FALSE ACCUSATIONS

Because tracking devices are linked to user accounts, they could be misused to 'prove' ownership of someone else's possessions. Someone could, for example, plant a tracker on another person's belongings to falsely claim them as their own.

INVASION OF PRIVACY

These devices are designed to share location data with the user via other people's phones, which can unintentionally broadcast someone's movements without their consent. This makes them vulnerable to being monitored by strangers without realising.

DIFFICULT TO DETECT

Many tracking devices are designed to be discreet, but that also means they're easy to hide. Without proactive checking or the right tech to detect them, children and young people might not realise they're being tracked.

Advice for Parents & Educators

WATCH FOR WARNING SIGNS

If a child's peers always seem to know their location – whether in person or hinted at online – it could be worth checking for tracking devices. Some, like AirTags, will eventually make a noise if separated from their owner. Listen out for a chirping sound.

CHECK LIKELY HIDING SPOTS

Common places where trackers may be planted include jacket linings, bag seams pockets, or under bike seats. If you find one, take a photo of the serial number before disposing of it – this could help police trace the account it's linked to.

USE DETECTION APPS

Apple devices running iOS 14.5 or later will notify users of unknown AirTags nearby. Android users can install Apple's 'Tracker Detect' or the third-party app 'AirGuard' to scan for tracking devices from various manufacturers.

HAVE THE CONVERSATION

Talk to your child about what tracking devices are, what signs to look out for, and how they might be misused. Emphasise the legal consequences of using them to prank, harass, or monitor someone.

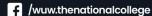
